


The Gurkha Connection

About *The Gurkha Connection*

- 27 young people aged 12-18 from Hart & Rushmoor – The Wavell School, Farnborough; West End Centre, Aldershot; The Sixth Form College Farnborough
- Young people took a central leading role, culminating in an exhibition and commemorative book
- Throughout, the young people developed confidence, research and teamwork skills

About *The Gurkha Connection*

- 2015 saw the 200 year anniversary of service by the Gurkhas to the British Crown
- Showcased, celebrated and commemorated the important and historic relationship between the Gurkhas and the British Army
- Recognised and celebrated the local Nepali community

 - community interviews, heritage workshops, cultural & research trips, and photography & exhibition workshops
- The young people worked with:
 - professionals including photographers, heritage and museum experts
 - serving personnel from 10 The Queen's Own Gurkha Logistic Regiment (10 QOGLR) & members of Maddhat Shamuha – Nepalese Help




